The Island Free School was officially opened on 8th October 2014 by the Island's MP, Mr Andrew Turner. The uplifting ceremony was attended by staff, students, Governors, press, and members of the local community.

Guests entered the hall to piano music played by talented pupils, Cameron and Ted. The Head of Year 7, Mr Peace, welcomed everyone, announcing that: "This is a really momentous occasion for us – and the Isle of Wight."

Mr Turner MP then gave a talk. "I remember when the Island Free School was a twinkle in the eye of the visionary founders... look how far it has come!" he said. "As a former teacher, I know the basic principles of what makes a good school – and I feel that it's good here. This is a small, intimate school where every student will be known to every teacher, and it will allow every student to reach their full potential."

He added: "I wish you all the very best of luck."

Pupils then spoke eloquently about their experiences of the school. One student referred to it as her "second home", while another reported that "not one second is boring". One girl said: "If students have dreams, then the teachers will help you to fulfil your dreams."

Mr Boyd, Headmaster, thanked the students and added: "We've made an outstanding start and there's so much in the pipeline." With the help of Mr Turner, he unveiled a perspex plaque to commemorate the school's official opening.

As guests left, they were thanked by Mr Boyd and the senior team. "It's such a pleasure to show people around," he said. "As you can see, we've got so much to offer families on the Island!"

The happy hike around the Isle of Wight

Students were surprised when they were told to 'take a hike' in their first week. But as pupil **Flynn Terry** explains, this led to an amazing adventure to remember...

On Friday 12th September 2014, the whole of Year 7 and all the staff were dropped off at various locations around the countryside on the Isle of Wight. The challenge was to navigate a route and support each other on a 10 mile hike back to school before the end of the day. It was our first 'pre' Duke of Edinburgh Award challenge and we were excited but didn't know what to expect. Each tutor group was dropped off in a different place somewhere on the Island and shown their starting point on a map. We all took turns to try and direct our group back to school.

We had to use the map reading skills we had learnt earlier on that week in Geography to navigate ourselves along the route that Mr Boyd had set out for us. Every hour we had to send our coordinates on the map back to the school office via a mobile phone.

It was really difficult for us all (including the teachers) but using teamwork skills we successfully completed this really challenging task. If anyone started flagging, we'd tell jokes – then the student would burst out laughing or walk off quickly to get away!

The Council could not afford to keep it open but we have taken over the running of the sports hall, playing field and astroturf, to ensure that this vital community resource remains open. Head of PE & Enrichment, Mr Malkin (pictured right), explains: "This gives us brilliant facilities and also the community

Being an integral part of Ventnor's Evacuation Plan is another way that we intend to do our bit. Our Site Manager, Mr Little explains that: "If a major emergency happens in Ventnor, for example a landslip or flooding, then our school will let the community use Rew Valley as an emergency shelter".

Working with the Town Council

Similarly, our involvement in the 'Our Place!' initiative should benefit everyone. Ventnor Town Council can apply for money from the Government for community projects and Headmaster Mr Boyd says that the school is keen to help. "We are going to organise a summer fete on the school field for the whole of Ventnor, with a marquee, music and all kinds of activities, to bring the whole town together", he says.

"We look forward to developing further links, and embedding our school into the heart of the community, in the months and years ahead."
