his added onto the amount of money which Year 8 raised during the Summer Show last year, made a grand total of £389.23.



We played for about an hour, playing the start and end pieces of music from the concert that we would be performing later that day in Medina theatre. Some members of the Royal Marines Band (that came from the Isle of Wight) talked to us after playing their music to tell us how we could join the Royal Marines Band Service. They told us that we did not need a music degree to join, as they give you free lessons on any instrument you like. They also said that if you did want to get a music degree after Secondary school (on the Isle of Wight), one of the best places to go is Platform one. I would like to say thank you to the Island Free School for this experience, as now I am thinking of undertaking a career with the Royal Marines Band Service, traveling around the world playing music to people.






