# Duke of Edinburgh Expedition

This year over 80 Year 9 pupils have taken part in the Duke of Edinburgh Award. Due to the large numbers inviolved they have completed their Expedition section in two parts, Grace C and Harry P give an overview of the whole award, and report back on the first qualifying expedition weekend, which they both attended.

ear 9 pupils have taken part in their Bronze Duke of Edinburgh (DofE) award and have completed their expedition. There are three levels of DofE increasing in difficulty: Bronze, Silver and Gold, but our pupils took on the challenge of the Bronze Award.

Achieving a Bronze Award is no easy feat, in order to meet all criteria pupils had to complete all four elements of the award (Volunteering, Physical, Skills and Expedition).

From the Volunteering, Physical and Skills sections the participant must choose to do one category for six months for an hour a week and the other two for three months. For the expedition section we completed both a practise walk and an assessed walk. Pupils came up with their own route and had to find their way from start to finish.

On Saturday 4 May and Sunday 5 May we completed our expedition alongside many of our year group, and spoke to some pupils to see what they thought about the expedition. The pupils we spoke to said that they enjoyed it and learned new skills, however they did find it quite challenging towards the end, they noted that getting through it as a team was key. Each team member worked well and each had roles to work efficiently and quickly. Mr Hooper (DofE leader) said "The pupils in year 9 were a credit to the school. They all worked exceptionally well in their DofE teams. They cooked some wonderful food and all had a laugh along the way. To capture the memory of the weekend each pupil was asked to take a single photgraph to represent the weekend, and this they can keep to remember their success.

All pupils who successfully complete all four sections will be awarded the Bronze Duke of Edinburgh qualification which comes with a certificate and badge.




